HIST 263 – Modern World History, 1700—Present – Approved

HIST 323 – Introduction to Archival Practices – Approved pending approval of AHA 251

**HIST 375** – The Middle East from the Rise of Islam to 1500 – Approved (replaces HIST 271)

HIST 377 – History of Iran (Currently taught as a "Topics" class) – Approved

HIST 384 – History of Africa (replaces HIST 285) – Approved

HIST 393 - History of China - Approved

HIST 405 – The Modern Civil Rights Movement – Approved

HIST 435 – Revolutionary Movements in Latin American History – has been a Topics course – Approved with change to prereq of HIST 112 or 263

Dr. Dixon plans to present HIST 394 for approval at the next meeting.
