November 7, 1989

Pick up buses from garage and meet Mr. Lloyd, Mr. Shoemaker, and Mr. Rogers at Spring Mill School. Pass out driver packets.

Students arrive and report to homerooms where they meet parent leaders.

Attendance taken in the bus - all students loaded. Names of those students who do not go given to Mrs. Baker, and Mr. Jobe.

TEACHERS NOTE: We must provide 1 day lesson plans for a fifth grade teacher if any of our children miss the bus or cannot join us for some reason. Please have plans to Mr. Rogers no later than Monday, 11/6/88. Mr. Rogers will be responsible for securing plans and assigning students to teachers.

REMEMBER: We attempt to maintain quiet, orderly buses. Talking of parents, teachers, and students should be kept to instructional activities NOT conversations.

8:30 a.m. Pull out for Terre Haute.

TEACHERS: Pick narrators to read narrative.
Maps are also provided for the children to mark the cities and parks which are mentioned. They may also want to draw roads connecting cities which we pass.

9:00 a.m. Airport

9:10 a.m. Plainfield exit: Plainfield town laid out in 1839. It was named by Quaker settlers, the "plain people". Presumably the name is commendatory.

Hendricks County: Organized in 1824 and named for William Hendricks, governor of Indiana 1822 - 1825.

9:20 a.m. Morgan County: Organized in 1822 and named for General Daniel Morgan, who served under Arnold at Quebec in 1775-76 and defeated Tarleton at Cowpens in 1781.

9:35 a.m. Cloverdale exit: Cloverdale is a small town in Putnam County. A post office was established here in 1836 and named Clover Dale. "for the many large fields of clover, and the lovely shady dales."

Putnam County: Organized in 1822 and named for General Israel Putnam.

Greencastle: County seat of Putnam County and named for Greencastle, Pennsylvania, the hometown of the earliest settler, Ephraim Dukes, who came here in 1821. One local legend that attempts to explain the name goes: "The first man that settled in this area built a home and built it on--I don't know whether it was on posts or he had it laying down for a footing--but after the house was built, they started to sprout, you know, and grow, so he called it his green castle."

10:00 a.m. Enter Clay County and Brazil Exit: Brazil is the county seat for Clay County, settled before 1834, founded in 1844 and named for Brazil, South America, which was in the news at the time. Clay County was organized in 1825 and named for Henry Clay, the Kentucky orator and statesman.

10:10 a.m. Hulman Field: Passing on the north side of the road will be Hulman Airfield and the Indiana National Guard Flight Station. The Hulman Family started a family business in Terre Haute and became very wealthy. They endowed Rose-Poly Institute, Engineering School now known as Rose-Hulman and is one of the top 10 engineering schools in the United States.

10:20 a.m. Terre Haute:

Terre Haute: the county seat of Vigo County. It was a French settlement from about 1720 to 1763 and called Terre Haute. "high land." It was platted in 1816.





Dear Parents,

During the 1983-84 school year the fourth (4th) grade teachers decided that learning Indiana History could be based on concrete experiences. In pursuit of that concept, the teachers applied for a modest grant through Washington Township Schools which would fund a summer workshop. The grant was approved and the workshop time was used to plan a five (5) year comprehensive program to study Indiana.

The workshop was to accomplish the following objectives:

- A. Develop several one (1) day field trips for year 1983-84.
- B. Develop a two (2) day (overnight) field trip for school year 1983-84 and sketch out four (4) additional two (2) day (overnight) trips for years 1984-85, 1985-86, 1986-87, 1987-88.
- C. Develop materials for use by children before, during, and after the historical field trips.
- D. Develop a packet of materials for parents.
- E. Develop a process to integrate representatives from the State Wide Historical Society into the fourth (4) grade classes in Washington Township Schools during their field trips.
- F. Develop a process for a slide and/or video tape production prepared by the students and teachers upon completion of their trips.

In order to protect the health and welfare of students, Indiana rules and regulations require that schools observe certain safeguards in the administration of medication. If we are to administer medicine to your child, the following procedures will be observed:

Vigo County was organized in 1818 and named for Colonel Francis Vigo, a Sardinian merchant who came to Vincennes about 1777 and fought with George Rogers Clark's army.

NOTE: Sullivan is the county seat of Sullivan County, Indiana, where all county matters of government are handled.

Sullivan County was organized in 1817 and named for General Daniel Sullivan, who was killed by Indians while carrying messages from Vincennes to Louisville during the Revolution.

The town of Sullivan was laid out in 1842 just 25 years after Sullivan County was named by our states founding fathers.
- 11:20 a.m. Carlisle - Small town in Sullivan County. Settled in 1803 and platted in 1815. Named for Carlisle, Pennsylvania, home of some of the settlers.
- 11:35 a.m. Entering Knox County - Knox County - Organized in 1790 and named for General Henry Knox, artillery officer of the Revolutionary War and Secretary of War 1785 - 1795

11:45 a.m. Oaktown - Formerly called Oak Station, it was laid out in 1867. Named because of the saw mills and the abundance of oak trees.

12:10 p.m. 12:30 p.m. Arrive in Vincennes - Vincennes is in Knox County and is the county seat. It is the capitol of the Old Northwest Territory, and the oldest town in Indiana. Some say a French Trading Post was established here as early as 1683. Settlers arrived before 1727, and a fort was built about 1732 under the command of Francois-Marie Bissat, Sieur de Vincennes, for whom it was named about 1736 when he was captured and burned at the stake by Chickasaw Indians. Before 1736 it went by several names including Au Post, Post Oiabache, and Post St. Vincent.

- 9:15 a.m. WEST FORK OF WHITE RIVER. - When I was there in April, it was overflowing. Very deep here - averages 26 feet.
- 9:20 a.m. WASHINGTON, INDIANA - Platted in 1815 and apparently named for George Washington - Formerly called Liverpool.
- 9:25 a.m. MONTGOMERY, INDIANA - Named for Valentine Montgomery, who platted the town in 1865. If time permits a 10 minute stop will be made. ALSO, it is the home of the second oldest church in the Northwest Territory. The oldest church is the Cathedral at Vincennes. This is also the original home of Notre Dame University. In 1818 Father Sorin of the Holy Cross founded the church of St. Peter at Montgomery. "The bishop, a few years later, decided to trade land in South Bend for the property owned by St. Peters and the Father and the brothers were moved to South Bend," stated Father Mergen of St. Peters. Today's church was built in 1865.
- 9:35 a.m. CANNELBURG, INDIANA - This town was originally called Clark's Station, for Andrew Clark, the first settler, the town was laid out in 1872 and named for the cannel coal here, mined by the Buckeye Cannel Coal Company.

The name was coined from two personal names: Lowe, honoring the engineer of the first train through the town, and Gootee, for the founder and owner of the land where the town was built. Now in Martin County - Martin County was organized in 1820 and named for Major John P. Martin of Newport, Kentucky.

9:45 a.m. EAST FORK OF WHITE RIVER

9:50 a.m. SHOALS - County Seat of Martin County - Settled in 1816 and so named because of it's location at a shoals, a ford or shallow place, in White River. Formerly called Daugherty's Shoals, for William Daugherty, early settler, and a shallow ford on White River.

9:55 a.m. TOWN OF HURON, INDIANA - Platted in 1859, originally called Hoard's Station, for William Hoard, pioneer land owner, but renamed for Huron County, Ohio by settlers who came from there in about 1855.

YOU ARE NOW IN LAWRENCE COUNTY, INDIANA Organized in 1818 and named for Captain James Lawrence, of the U.S. Frigate Chesapeake. One of the most noted natives of Lawrence County Indiana is our own Mrs. Baker.

10:05 a.m. MITCHELL, INDIANA - Land near here was settled as early as 1813, but the town wasn't platted until 1852. It was named for O. M. Mitchell, a construction engineer for the Ohio and Mississippi Railroad, which was built here in 1856.

10:15 a.m. SPRING MILL STATE PARK - Visit Virgil Grissom Memorial - All groups off buses.

10:30 a.m. Load buses and drive to Spring Mill Village.

Group A - Mrs. Dixon and Group B - Mrs. Franklin take tour of the Village.

Group C - Mrs. Perkins and Group D - Mr. Rogers take the Nature Hike.

1:30 p.m. HARRODSBURG, INDIANA - Formerly called Newgene, it was platted in 1836. In 1837 the name was changed because the town settlers were from Harrodsburg, Kentucky.

1:40 p.m. BLOOMINGTON, INDIANA - County seat of Monroe County. Settled in 1815 and platted in 1818. According to local legend, the name was suggested when a group of pioneers, picnicking on a nearby hillside, were impressed by the blooming flowers and foliage below them. Probably named for the early pioneer William Bloom.

2:00 p.m. MARTINSVILLE, INDIANA - County seat of Morgan County, laid out in 1822 and named after John Martin, senior member of the board of commissioners who located the county seat here.

MORGAN COUNTY, INDIANA - Organized in 1822 and named after General Daniel Morgan, who served under Arnold at Quebec in 1775 and 1776 and defeated Tarleton at Cowpens in 1781.

2:00 p.m. GRASSYFORK FISHERY - This is a very unorganized tour. The shipping manager will probably be at the office but may not be. A short stop. Here is a fishery that sell 300,000 small gold fish daily. These are shipped world wide along with several special "fancy" types.

The fish boxes (about 20" square) are for nesting. We should see some fish nesting and care should be exercised as kids move around the ponds.

If the shipping supervisor is not available we can break into groups or I will give a brief survey of Goldfish breeding and raising them. Each group can then look around the fish hatchery.
