Developing the Topic

- A. Read the essays in Miller, Chapter 13 to determine your **general focus**:
 - 1. Designing (some form) of Public Space
 - or
 - 2. Addressing our (changing/threatened) relationship to Nature or
 - 3. A combination of "#1 and #2
 - 4. Notes:
 - a. Regardless of which of the above you choose, you MUST approach it from the perspective of your own individual major or (larger) discipline.
 - b. This project MUST have a "public component": a policy change; a new public space; an entrepreneurial endeavor, etc. that requires research, survey, analysis, and imaginative design.
- B. Determine the **specific topic**; have this approved by the Instructor.
- C. Three Activities for Development:
 - 1. Write a list of 10 questions that someone in your field might ask about the project.
 - 2. Write a list of vocabulary terms (and their definitions) that someone in your discipline would use when discussing the project.
 - 3. Write a "Wish-List" of possible (however improbable) people you could/would interview (include international/national/and local) for your project.
 - 4. Find 4 5 book or scholarly journals on your topic.

D. The Research Paper Proposal:

Assignment:

After completing the activities in "C" (above), write the Proposal. It should include:

A "Working Title"

A statement specifying the nature of your project, it's intended scope; and it's significance to both you and your community;

A statement in which you identify your major/or discipline and then specify how your chosen field will inform your approach to this project;

A battle plan of "how/where/when/why/who" you intend to read, survey, interview, etc.

Draft:	One – two pages; include a hard copy for Peer Review
Revision:	Two - three pages
Margins:	One-inch margins on all sides
