#### **Discussion of Possible Programs:** Daniel Wade

- Daniel Wade presented possible programs.
- See page three for program models (as Dan Wade described on the board).
- The IMA is encouraging a model/structure like the combined degree model.
- David Gunn noted that industry will probably move to hire five-year graduates for CPA and four-year graduates for other purposes.
- No matter the program, students must be taught the basics.

- There is no way to both broaden the degree and teach the details, in the undergraduate program.
- The question was raised: "Is USI leading the way, or are there schools out there that are way ahead?
  - o Answered:
    - Some schools have gone to Accounting Information Systems.
    - Some schools have gone to the tracks.
    - To change to the combined would place USI on the leading edge.
- Educators/Administrators need to look at the market.
- Some schools have moved to integrated blocks.
- Some schools are going to 6-9 hour classes.

- Daniel Wade thanked Accounting Circle members and faculty for their assistance and support on the matter of curriculum.
- The School of Business Curriculum Committee will continue to develop the Combined Degree Model and will then meet the Circle Curriculum Committee for additional input.
