Applying for Financial Aid Links:

- www.fafsa.gov This web site is where you complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is your initial application for grants, loans, work study, etc. In order to be considered for grants offered by the state of Indiana, your FAFSA must be received by the federal processor no later than March 10 every year.
- www.pin.ed.gov This web site is your source of information for the Federal Student Aid PIN. Your PIN can be used each year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your Federal Student Aid records online. Note: Beginning in late April, the Department of Education will be adopting the best practice of using a username and password instead of the PIN.
- www.collegegoalsunday.org Applying for financial aid means filling out complicated applications. College Goal Sunday makes the process easier. Attend College Goal Sunday for free assistance filling out your financial aid application.
- www.gibill.va.gov The GI Bill (the generic term comprising various education assistance programs administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs) provides benefits to veterans, service members, and some dependents of disabled or deceased veterans wishing to pursue an education.
