

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The purpose of this newsletter is to keep stakeholders updated on progress and accomplishments of the Advanced Nurse Education – Nurse Practitioner Residency (ANE-NPR) Program.

04 TRAINING MODULES

In 2019, the University of Southern Indiana (USI) was awarded a four-year \$1.7 million federal HRSA grant to develop this 12-month residency program for nurse practitioner (NP) graduates in primary care settings serving rural and underserved populations in southwestern Indiana.

The program will support a total of 11 graduate NPs with a family nurse practitioner (FNP) or psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner (PMHNP) specialty over a three-year period of time.

USI is collaborating with community-based health clinics to provide these unique experiences:

- ECHO Community Healthcare
- Southwestern Behavioral Healthcare
- Southern Indiana Community Health Center
- Samaritan Center

The residents focus will be both clinical and academic enhancements that will assist in the transition from academia to practice and prepare them as primary care providers. The residency program includes precepted clinical practice, specialty rotations, mentoring sessions and enhanced didactic education.

UNIQUE OPPORTUNITIES

SPECIALTY CLINICS

Each resident spends time in multiple specialty areas. Working in rural and underserved areas, primary care providers will often be the first to see these patients. Specialists offer expert insight for the residents into their specialty areas, valuable clinical pearls, referral considerations, and allows time for wonderful networking opportunities.

Areas the residents have spent time in these first months include: Wound Clinic, Cardiology, Ear/Nose/Throat (ENT), Gastroenterology, General Surgery, Pulmonary, Geriatrics, Orthopedics, and OB/GYN.

FALL WORKSHOP

The workshop included in-person disscussions with Dr. Hoagland and Lynn Schnautz of Deaconess Health System. Dr. Hoagland presented on Diagnostic Imaging and Lynn presented on EKG Interpretation in the Primary Care setting.

Meeting providers in the field has been very beneficial for the residents and the didactic component of the residency program.

TRAINING MODULES

MEDICATION FOR ADDICTION TREATMENT (MAT) TRAINING:

Medications for Addiction Treatment (MAT) of Substance Use Disorders involves a combination of medications that targets the brain, and psychosocial interventions (e.g., counseling, skills development) aimed at improving treatment outcomes. Research shows that medications and therapy together may be more successful than either treatment method alone.

The residents individually completed the 24-hour online MAT training. While the trainings focused on a broad range of substance use disorder treatments, its primary focus is on treatment of opioid use disorders (OUD). Opioids include a class of drugs often prescribed for pain—morphine, fentanyl, oxycodone, and hydrocodone—as well as illicit drugs, such as heroin. The Federal Drug Administration (FDA) has approved three medications for the treatment of OUD: methadone, buprenorphine, and naltrexone.

CHRONIC PAIN SERIES

The Chronic Pain Series provided the residents with knowledge on treating chronic pain. The curriculum was created in an effort to consolidate the vast amount of information available to clinicians into a course that provides clinicians with the information, resources, and knowledge they need to treat their patients who suffer from chronic pain, including non-pharmacological treatments. The result is the most comprehensive and up to date curriculum developed thus far for the treatment of chronic pain.
