The purpose of this newsletter is to keep stakeholders updated on progress and accomplishments of the Advanced Nurse Education – Nurse Practitioner Residency (ANE-NPR) Program.

In 2019, the University of Southern Indiana (USI) was awarded a four-year \$1.7 million federal HRSA grant to develop this 12-month residency program for nurse practitioner (NP) graduates in primary care settings serving rural and underserved populations in southwestern Indiana.

USI is collaborating with community-based health clinics to provide these unique experiences:

- Southwestern Behavioral Healthcare
- Southern Indiana Community Health Center
- Samaritan Center
- ECHO Community Health Care

The residents focus will be both clinical and academic enhancements that will assist in the transition from academia to practice and prepare them as primary care providers. The residency program includes precepted clinical practice, specialty rotations, mentoring sessions and enhanced didactic education.

Mackenzie attended the MAIA conference in August 2022; keynote speakers were **Gregory Jicha, MD, PhD,** a Professor of Neurology with University of Kentucky HealthCare. He is board certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and presented on *Normal Brain Aging.*

Erin Ramsey, MPA, has worked in the non-profit sector for 30 years and has a degree in child development and psychology from California State University. Erin presented *Rest and Rejuvenate: Paving a Positive Path Forward.* Erin owns a farm to provide a place of inspiration and rejuvenation for the well-being of others.

Pauline Boss, PhD, shared her stress-based approach to find meaning and new hope through her presentation, *Caregiving Through Uncertain Times: Finding Meaning and New Hope in Ambiguous Loss.* Boss has studied ambiguous loss since the 1970's, giving families guidance through care giving.

John Omura, MD, MPH, and Laura Whalen, MPH, presented *Risk Reduction Strategies for Brain Health.* Omura is the Medical Officer on the Alzheimers Disease Team for the CDC. He actively participates in national initiatives to implement public health approaches to addressing brain health, Alzheimer's disease and related dementias and healthy aging. Whalen is an epidemiologist and a Public Health Advisor for the CDC. She coordinates support to state, local and tribal public health departments in implementing public health approaches to addressing brain health, including Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, and elevating early detection and diagnosis of dementia as a public health priority

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
