



> 1,028 Graduates in 1998 to 1,715 Graduates in 2008






# AFFORDABILITY

  - 34% Less than the Other Four-Year Residential Institutions




## **1993-1994 TUITION AND FEES**





## 2008-2009 TUITION AND FEES




# **STATE APPROPRIATIONS**

- Difference in Appropriation Per-FTE-Hoosier Continues to be Significant
- Funding Received at USI is 58.7% of the Statewide Average of the Four-Year Residential Institutions
- Enrollment Funding Formula Fully Funded only <u>Twice</u> in the Past Decade
- Full Funding of Enrollment Formula Critical to a Growing and Developing Campus

# **USI FOUNDATION**

## **2007 PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE**

"Commissioned to examine the University's leadership and responsiveness to regional needs and to recommend academic and training programs that will meet the future workforce and economic development needs of the region."



## **2007 PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE**

- Task Force conducted on a five-year cycle
- Implemented 12 of 13 academic programs indentified from the 2000 Task Force
- Developed increased co-op and internship opportunities
- Increased non-credit and workforce training offerings
- Expanded involvement with P-12 education
- Developed a regional leadership program



## **2007 PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE**

### 2007 Findings:

- Increased need for college-educated employees
- Increased access to higher education through alternative delivery systems
- Need for USI to assume a broader role in developing an entrepreneurial culture in southern Indiana
- Affirmed USI's academic program development plan through 2011

#### **Enrollment Change Funding**

 Request Full Funding of Enrollment Formula for Additional 155 Students - \$542,500

#### **Degree Completion**

 Request Funding for Increase of 122 in Number of Degrees Completed - \$486,000

#### **On-Time Degree Completion**

 Request Funding for 4.3% Increase in Four-Year Graduation Rate - \$385,835



### 2009-2011 OPERATING BUDGET REQUEST

#### **Special Appropriation Adjustment**

- Request Additional Funding to Address
  Disparities in Funding
  - \$250 Per-FTE-Hoosier Student in 2009-2010
  - \$125 Per-FTE-Hoosier Student in 2010-2011

#### **Funding for Maintenance of Current Programs**

- Request Funds to Maintain Current Programs

(Energy, Health Insurance, Transportation)



### QUALITY IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVES

### **2008 Reaching Higher** Charge to Institutions:

"to dramatically improve the number and timeliness of college graduates... institutions should be encouraged to be creative and experiment with piloting and implementing a variety of innovative and promising programs...to enhance and ensure a culture of college completion."





# **STEM TEACHING INSTITUTE**

- Growing shortage of teachers qualified to teach in STEM disciplines
- K-12 schools facing difficulties in finding qualified teachers in the STEM disciplines

### <u>Need</u>:

to increase the number of qualified teachers in STEM disciplines in K-12 schools

to increase the number of undergraduates majoring in STEM disciplines



## **STEM TEACHING INSTITUTE**

### <u>Purpose</u>

- Provide training and professional development opportunities to increase the number of qualified teachers in STEM disciplines
- Target recruitment of science and math majors to consider teaching in STEM disciplines as a profession

#### <u>Outcome</u>

Increased number of STEM qualified teachers in
 K-12 schools and undergraduates in STEM majors



- Today's students are working more hours off campus while attending higher education
- Students engaged in off-campus employment are less likely to be involved in on-campus learning experiences

#### <u>Need</u>:

on campus work experiences to facilitate retention and degree completion

additional on campus employment to "plug" students into campus networks and encourage their academic success



### **Affordable Degree Attainment** ADAPT - Arrough Professional Training

#### Purpose

- Provide intensive academic and career preparatory services for students most at-risk of failing to complete their degrees
- Improve the quality and quantity of on-campus work experiences and provide professional training for student workers

#### Outcome

- Retain a larger number of working students and increase degree completion



# **TEACHING THEATRE**

Number One Capital Project for 2009-2011 Biennium Project will replace off-campus theatre and provide new on-campus multipurpose facility



Request for \$15,000,000 in authorization for Construction of the Project



# **TEACHING THEATRE**

Propose construction of 350 seat multipurpose Teaching Theatre

Request \$8,000,000 in fee replacement bonding authorization and \$7,000,000 in authorization only



University is committed to matching State support for the project with \$7,000,000 in private funds
